Special Days - Visits and visitors

Our new academic year started off with a wonderful welcome service at St Andrew's Church for our new Reception class. They were taken to the church by their Year 6 peers, who showed excellent school leadership qualities as they supported the younger children. Revd. Sarah led the service and all of the Reception class were presented with a special book from the church.





A few examples of Learning in the classroom

The children soon settled in their new classes and began their learning with a real air of purposefulness. Our youngest children, in Nursery, loved exploring the equipment in their new outside space while our Reception class quickly got to grips with their new early morning routine which included a carousel of activities - reading, fine motor skill development, pencil skills and construction.







Year 6 began exploring the book 'The Mysteries of Harris Burdick' as inspiration for their own writing and created drama scenes to imagine what was happening in the pictures they were given. Year 5, meanwhile, invited me to a sea shanty performance, playing on their xylophones accompanied by Miss Sewell on the violin.





Year 3 began learning about pentatonic scales. The children used their hands to indicate whether the pitch was high or low. Their class song was written in a pentatonic scale so they made up their own five note melody using the same notes, which they then performed.

Year 2 had an active start, practising their swift responses, goal keeping, in their PE lessons while Year 1 explored the outside space for their new topic and made a good start with their phonic lessons.








Year 5 and Reception had their first buddy reading session together while Year 4 designed e-safety posters to remind themselves and others of all that they have to do to keep themselves safe whilst online.

And all of this was completed in the first week!



Year 3 Science



As our science subject lead we can always expect Dr Collins to ensure that her Year 3 class complete exciting science lessons. This term their study of nutrition started with them sorting food items into their nutrition groups. It was a fun activity which they completed in teams.

A few weeks later Year 3 were creating their own skeletons in science, making sure that they had all the bones in the right place!





In their history, Year 2 went on a treasure hunt using newspaper articles and photos as sources to prove that the moon landing really happened!

Year 4 children learnt about tooth decay in their science work. They designed and conducted an investigation into the effects of different liquids on their teeth. Eggs were used for the investigation as their shells shares some properties with the enamel in our teeth. The children had to consider how to keep it a fair test by measuring each liquid carefully. They then eagerly waited to observe changes over time.



Year 6 got creative by exploring how to create different effects with water colours in their art work. They added fine and coarse salt, bubble wrap, cling film and used toothpicks to create interesting textures and then created graduated the washes.

Our Reception class created story books which they then enjoyed reading to their peers.



PSHE: The Coram Life Tent

The Coram Life Tent paid its annual visit and all of our classes had a PSHE session with the SCARF presenter. The sessions covered a range of topics from how to keep their body strong through exercise and diet (Y1) to taking care of their brains (Y3) and being able to make important decisions (Y6).







Harvest Appeal

We launched our Harvest Appeal collecting food items (cans, dry foodstuffs - such as pasta, rice, cereals etc.) and toiletries for the local food bank. The collection subsequently went to Hertford and Ware Food Bank.



Curriculum Evening

We held our Curriculum Evening for Reception to Year 6 on Thursday, 26th September. The teachers covered important aspects of the school curriculum which affected their particular year groups. The topics therefore ranged from phonics, multiplication tests to the Year 6 SAT tests. The meetings were informative and well attended.

Harvest Festival at St Andrew's Church

We had a joyful service at St Andrew's Church for our Harvest Festival. The service was full of songs and contributions from the children and all of the classes gave thanks for all of the good things we have in their own personal style.





Internet Safety - 'The 2 Johns' - a reminder

The school held an Internet Safety Day. The Two Johns (external experts) held workshops for Year 1 to Year 6 and Nursery and Reception did their own safety talks which were age appropriate. The workshops were fun and very informative, the children listened attentively to the strong message —to enjoy the Internet but keep safe at all times. Parents and Carers were invited in for a parent session on how to help keep their children safe online.



Practical Maths

As part of developing our younger children's early maths skills, we are currently taking part in the 'Mastering Number' project led by the NCETM. Staff attended the national launch and subsequent training. They are now ensuring that the children are receiving additional maths mastery sessions on top of their well-established maths lessons. Year 2 have been learning how to use their new rekenrek resources to support their fluency with number. They are already making progress with 'magic counting' and moving the correct number of beads quickly and accurately!

Year 3 and 4 History Day

Our Lower Key Stage 2 children had an exciting hands-on experience when Hertford Museum visited the school to lead two workshops. Year 3 had a Stone Age themed workshop during which the children were able to handle artefacts from the Stone Age period, including a real mammoth tooth! They also spent time learning what archaeologists do and made a job advertisement for an archaeologist on a prehistoric dig. In the afternoon the children worked on a carousel of activities: making a Stone Age house, producing a floor timeline of the stone age period and dressing a mannequin in a Stone Age outfit. They all had a lot of fun and learned a lot too.









Year 4 explored life in Ancient Egypt and specifically the mummification process. The children were able to mummify a doll using bandages and also got to take a look at some replica artefacts.





Year 5 Art Work

Year 5 have some lovely pieces of art work on display. They have been exploring pattern and were asked to fill their silhouette with items which are important to them. There was quite a lot of footballs subsequently on display but also a pleasing amount of maths.

Story Writing

Year 1 and Year 2 have both been completing narrative units in their English work. Year 2 read the book 'The Frog and the Stranger' and then wrote their own stories about their chosen character. Once completed Year 2 took their writing down to the Year 1 classroom and shared their

stories with the Year 1 children, who are also in the process of writing their own stories.

Year 3 also 'published' their narrative writing by reading their stories to the Reception children. It was a lovely





way for Year 3 to share their work and the Reception children really enjoyed the experience.







Year 6 Trip to Stanstead Bury Farm

Year 6 visited Stanstead Bury Farm where they took part in a number of activities including; gardening in the Walled Garden, a history tour of St James' Church and Stanstead Bury House - they also went down in to the ice house! The children loved seeing the animals and eating their lunch in the hay barn. We would like to thank Mr and Mrs Trower for opening up their home and farm to help educate our children.







Our Nursery children were also out and about in our Forest School area. They were looking for spider webs and were fascinated with the patterns they made. The children liked the way the rain had fallen on them to make them more visible.



Water Safety Talk

Our Key Stage 2 children had a water safety talk led by Herts Fire Safety Team. The children listened very attentively as they learnt about how to behave safely around rivers and canals and what to do if they or a friend got into trouble. Their advice is for parents/carers to download What3words App onto their children's phone so that emergency services can instantly find their location if in trouble.

Black History Month

At the end of the first term we celebrated the work the classes had produced as part of Black History month. The Year 6 children recited poems by Benjamin Zephaniah and showed us biographies they had written about his life and the obstacles he had overcome. Year 5 had explored the artwork of Lubaina Himid, while Year 4 has learnt all about the newsreader Trevor McDonald. Year 3 learnt about the lasting contribution of Windrush migrants to the NHS and Year 1 and 2 told us the amazing story of Mary Seacole.

We began our second week after half term with a Remembrance Collective Worship for those who fell during the last two World Wars and for those who continue to serve in our armed services.

Ava and Harriet laid a wreath on behalf of the school, at St Andrew's war memorial, in remembrance of the local men and women who gave their lives during both World Wars.






Fantastic Work

As part of their English, Year 6 created non-chronological reports about their own made-up planets. Their beautiful work has been displayed and 'published' in a whole class booklet.





Published Work

Year 3 Science

Mr Hulme, one of our Governors, came into school to observe a Year 3 science investigation into the porosity of rocks. Through their testing the children discovered that some rocks are more porous than others and concluded that this was because some rocks had more holes in their structure than others.



Year 3 also had fun playing musical instrument 'snap'. This opened up lots of discussions about the names of instruments and their associated instrument families.



Reception's Pizza Express Trip

The Reception class went on their first school trip of the year to Pizza Express in Welwyn Garden City. The children made their own pizza and learnt about all the different jobs people do in a restaurant.

The children loved squashing out the sticky dough, spreading the sauce and adding a generous cheese topping. They even got to take their creations home with them. The trip has led to some

wonderful role play, both in and out of the classroom.





Road Safety Week (17th-23rd November)




We celebrated National Road Safety Week with an assembly around road safety. We thought about all of the Road Safety Heroes who help keep us safe. This was followed up in class with the teachers reminding the children about how they can keep themselves safe around roads or when travelling in cars.

More Excellent Learning



Before Bonfire night our Reception class made firework shapes by cutting small snips in different coloured paper. The children have also made fireworks pictures out of 2D shapes and have created fireworks paintings using paint and marbles.

Year 5 investigated friction in their practical science lesson. They were measuring and recording the resistance to move objects on different surfaces.



British Museum Trip







Year 4 visited the British Museum where they looked at the stunning sculptures and artefacts excavated from Ancient Egypt. The children became historical detectives trying to work out what some of the objects were and deducing what it told them about this ancient civilization.

Christmas Celebrations

Sharing the Nativity Story

The children in Nursery had a class visit from Reverend Sarah. They enjoyed listening to the story of the birth of Jesus and all concentrated really well. They told Reverend Sarah that Jesus was born in a stable and for their Christmas show they are retelling the Nativity story.

Our children decorated a Christmas tree which went on display at St Mary's Church as part of their Christmas tree display. Our tree had a range of decorations, inspired by the hymn 'We Three Kings', which the children had created. Some of the children had also written their hopes and dreams on the back of their crowns.

Debbie, our cook, said that she would be dreaming about roast potatoes for the next few weeks – but they really were delicious. EYFS Nativity








Year 6 were set the homework task to investigate the etymology of a
